SHOREBIRDS OF LOUISIANA



ID TIP: Long, thin, upturned bill. No black on head or neck.



ID TIP: Shorter, straighter bill than Avocet.



ID TIP: Larger body and longer bill than any other species.



ID TIP: Drab grey bird when standing, bright black and white wings in flight.



ID TIP: Bill roughly twice as long as head. More likely in vegetation than many species.



ID TIP: Bill roughly the same length as head. Overall more proportionate than Greater.



ID TIP: Species very similar. White wedge on back during flight. Stands still and probes straight up and down in a "sewing machine" motion.



ID TIP: Short pointed bill, "scaly" back pattern. Commonly found in upland areas.



ID TIP: Black double collar. Constant distinctive "killdeer" call. Occurs in more developed areas.

ID TIP: Similar to Black-bellied Plovers but daintier, smaller sharper bill, and black underside extends all the way to the rump.

ID TIP: Reddish-brown back, grey crown. Spins in circles while foraging.

ID TIP: Short, sharp bill. Black neck, chest, and facial markings in all seasons.





ID TIP: Long bill downturned at the end. Black belly spot in breeding. Probes while walking.

Semipalmated Plover



ID TIP: Short blunt bill with orange base and grey tip. Single dark collar.

Pectoral Sandpiper Calidris melanotos



ID TIP: Neck and breast stippled light and dark brown, very distinct from white belly.

Stilt Sandpiper Calidris himantopus



ID TIP: Distinct white eyebrow. Avoids saltwater.

Semipalmated Sandpiper



ID TIP: Short, blunt bill. Orange streak above the eye in breeding plumage.
